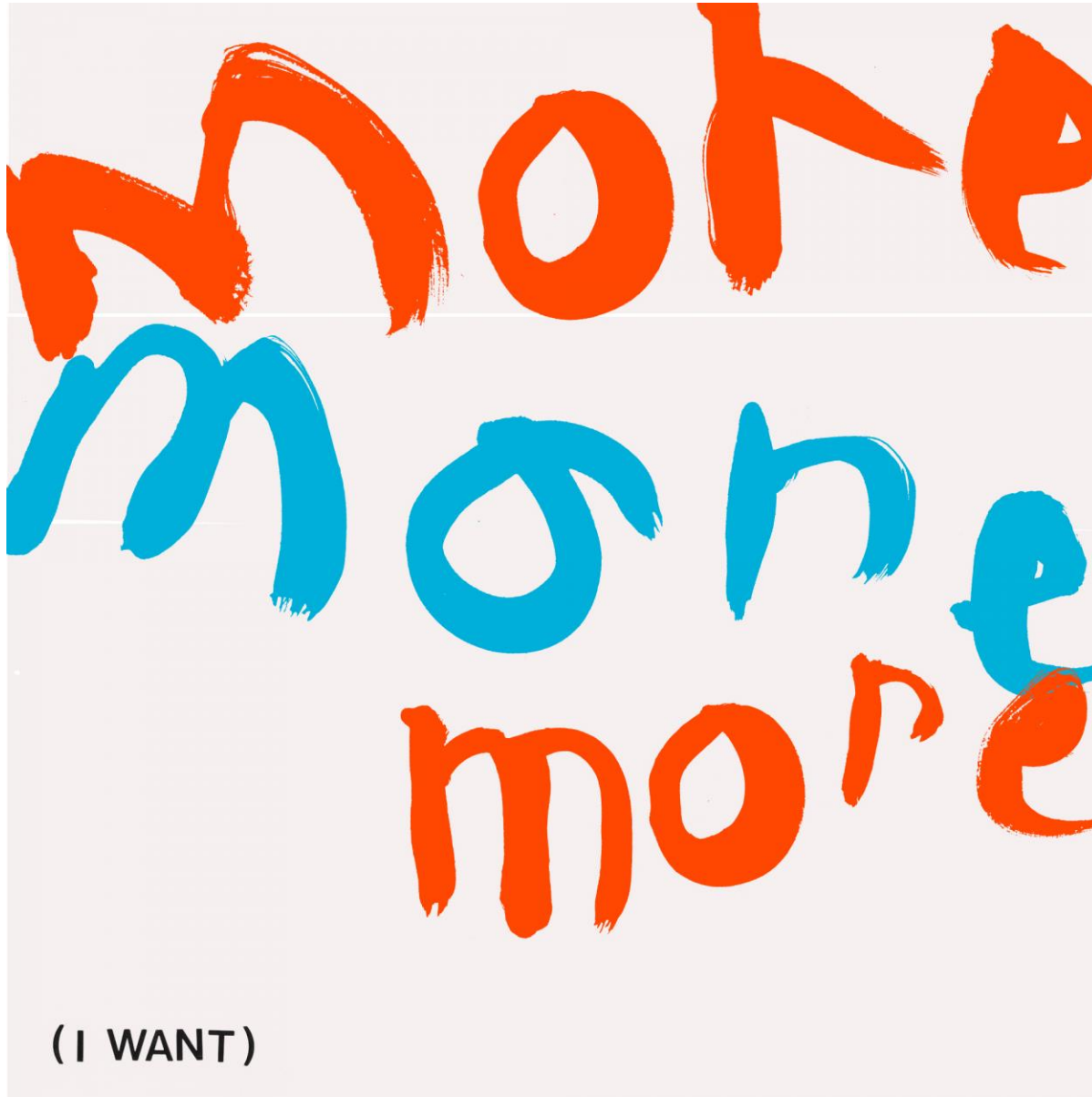

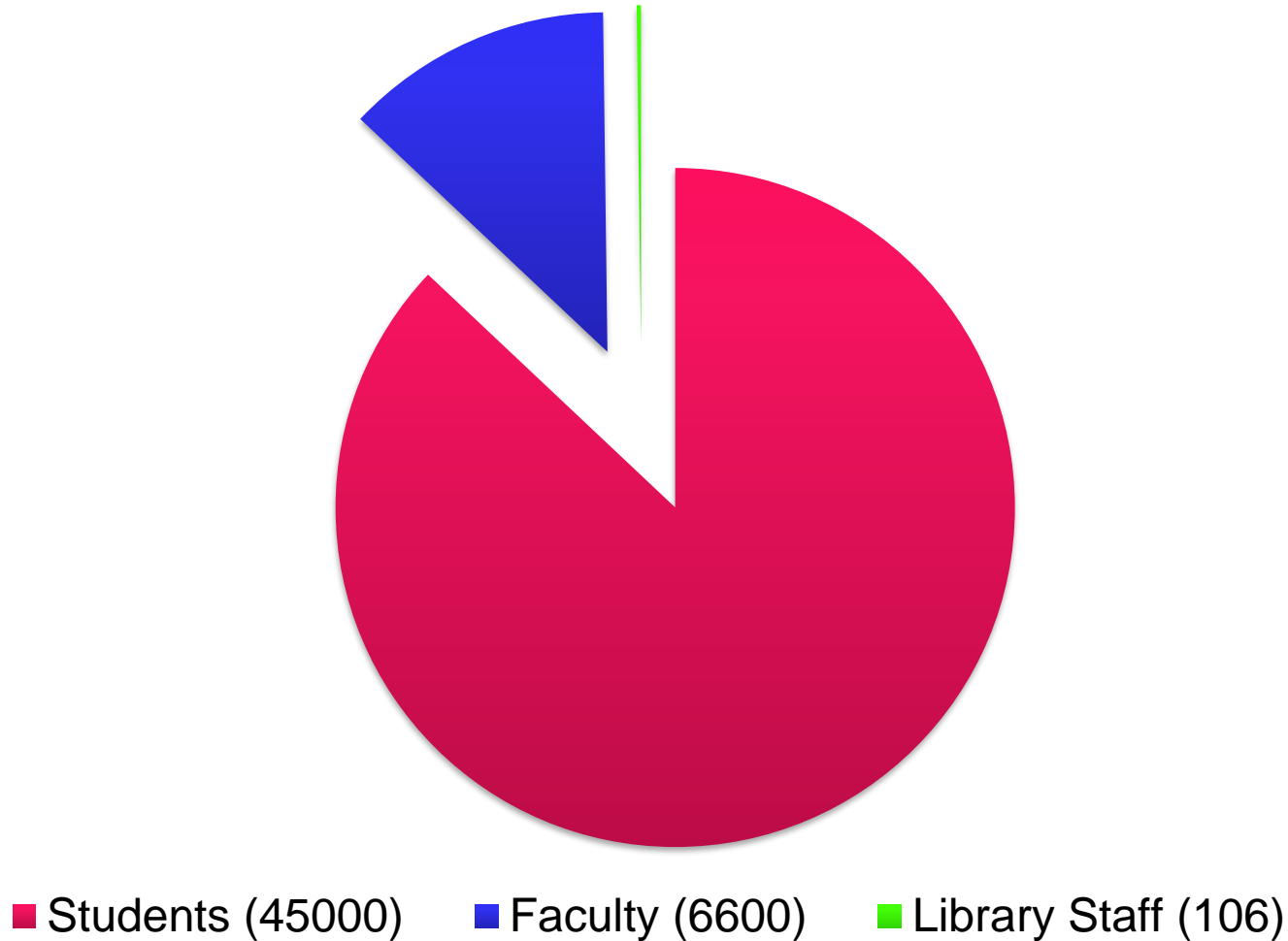

Who can use Scopus APIs?

Anyone can obtain an API Key and use the APIs free of charge, provided that our policies for using APIs and the data are honored. Full Scopus APIs access is only granted to customers with Scopus subscription. If do not have a Scopus subscription you can still use the APIs, however, you will have limited access to a basic metadata for most citation records, as well as to basic search functionality.

Other ways to get content

Among Scopus APIs, Only Science Direct identifies open access content clearly

What could the open source community do?

Fedora / VIVO / ORCID integrations – we can send citation data from our IRs to VIVO and ORCID profiles.

Reverse the direction – instead of pull, push.

Provide a simple deposit mechanism that not only meets funder mandates for external repositories, but populates our IRs, reports to VIVO and ORCID? Simplify researchers' lives, thus demonstrating the added value of the local institutional repository.
